Meeting held Nov. 1, 2017 3rd Floor, OMAH.

- 1. The meeting began at 7:30 with Denis Paccagnella welcoming visitors and new members. There were 8-10 visitors, including a group of senior highschool students from Patrick Fogarty. They introduced themselves and told the group what topic they were researching with the school's Environmental Studies group. Topics included research into palm oil, the importance of the canopy in Orillia, how pharmaceuticals that are dumped into the municipal water waste stream affect us, and climate change and its environmental effects on biodiversity.

A fox in neighbourhood yards and on highway (presumably eating squirrels and cottontails); robins huge flocks; young black bear (near Telford line); a flock of Hooded Mergansers; around 200 Bonaparte gulls acting like terns, plus 12 Great Blackback gulls; Piliated woodpecker eating grapes; a female grouse, and an American Avocet.

- 6. Correspondence A group in Nunavit are putting together a book of birds of Nunavit.
